OAAS Service Diploma - Each member Society of the OAAS can present one Service Diploma per year to a person who has given longtime and meritorious service to the Society. The award can be given to a husband and wife jointly. Service Diplomas **should not** be awarded routinely to members of the Executive – i.e. at the end of a President's term but instead to well deserving individuals without whom our societies would be lost. The recipient of a Service Diploma will receive a certificate and lapel pin from OAAS. Each diploma is \$10.00.

Early bird registration fee for 2008 is \$65 includes admission to all events. (early bird **deadline** is January 21, 2008)

Ag. Accomplishment Award - The OAAS recognizes volunteers who contribute consecutive years of time and energy to an Agricultural Society and whose work meets any or all of the following requirements.

Who is Eligible?

1. An individual who has made a significant contribution as a leader, volunteer **or** as a committee member.
2. Has been active in the Society through longtime involvement.
3. Promotes the community betterment by the Agricultural Society.
4. Promotes and develops activities to encourage our youth to participate in the Agricultural Society.

Youth – up to 20 years of age may be recognized for five or more years of volunteer service.

Adults – may be honoured for 10/15/20/25/30/40/ or more dedicated years of continued service.

Application Process: Complete application form., complete the form and return to OAAS. Each certificate costs \$5.00, with a limit of 10 certificates per order per year per association. Each order also requires an additional \$10 to cover postage.

Award: Each applicant will receive a certificate and OAAS lapel pin.

The Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions (C.A.F.E.), the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) and the Norfolk County Fair and Horse Show invite you to attend a 1-day Consumer Protection Workshop to learn how to minimize the risk of E-coli contamination at events that bring people and animals together.

Time: Registration: 8:00 a.m. Workshop: 8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.

The workshop will bring together fairs, exhibitions, petting zoo operators, organizers of agri-education and agri-tourism, and others with an interest in minimizing the risk of E-coli contamination. You will have the opportunity to participate in interactive discussions; learn how to develop site-specific tools to evaluate facilities; develop action plans to minimize the risks associated with E-coli; and leave with a “starter kit” for enhancing consumer protection.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS !!! ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY

Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions (C.A.F.E) has secured new federal funding through the Advancing Canadian Agriculture and Agri-Food Program (ACAAF) to work with Enigma Research Corporation in compelling an *Economic, Education, and Social Benefits Study*.

C.A.F.É Economic, Educational, and Social Benefits study will take place in 2008.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS

The ACAAF funding requires that 20 fairs and exhibitions across Canada be surveyed. Specifically, the study must survey 8 large fairs, 6 medium-sized fairs, and 6 small fairs across Canada. Events interested in participating in the research are invited to submit an application. This opportunity will assist fairs and exhibitions to obtain additional funding and all members are encouraged to apply.

BENEFITS OF PARTICIPATING

C.A.F.E. has secured Canada's leading event research firm to undertake the study.

Crews from Toronto-based Enigma Research Corporation will travel to each participating events to survey attendees. Participating fairs and exhibitions will receive individual final reports, designed to assist in securing additional private and public sector support for their event. Final reports will include the following:

- Estimates of the economic impact, employment supported and taxes generated by the event.
- Estimates of other economic benefits of the event, including spending by the local population.
- Measures of education-related benefits of the event, including fairgoers' interest in learning about agriculture, agri-food, and food safety.
- Measures of the social benefits of the event, including pride in the community, activities for families and youth, and other measurements.
- Identification of opportunities which could enhance fairs' corporate sponsorship and exhibit programs. Reports will include sponsor recall, attitudes towards sponsors, product use, and other measurements.
- Measures of the importance of agriculture and agri-food programming to fair attendees, participants, and the agricultural sector.
- Report on demographics of attendees.

NON-PARTICIPANT BENEFITS

An important mandate of the study is to make aggregate results accessible for all fairs and exhibitions across Canada. Events which are unable to participate or are not selected to be surveyed will receive access to general reports which can be applied to any fair of their size or type.

The aggregate reports will demonstrate the economic, social, and educational benefits of Canadian fairs and exhibitions. These tools will be designed to assist all fairs and exhibitions in obtaining additional public and private sector funding.

DEADLINE AND SELECTION

The ACAAF funding allows for only 20 fairs and exhibitions to be surveyed in this program. It is anticipated that more than 20 events will apply to participate. To ensure consideration, applications must be received before January 30, 2008.

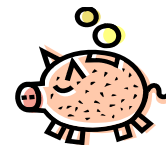

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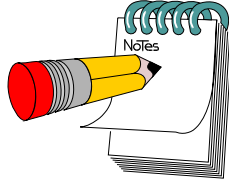
ROUND TABLE SUMMARIES FROM 2007 OAAS CONVENTION

Entertaining on a Shoestring Budget:

- Need to look outside the box when it comes to entertaining.
- Look at local entertainment instead of the high end
- Be careful with letting the agent know your budget
- Partnerships is important
- Find large organizations to assist with the costs

List of ideas for entertainment follows:

- Idol contest (various options to this the fair is for the finals, so you work with other events leading up to this)
- Talent Show as main event
- Fear Factor kind of program
- Spelling Bee
- Baseball game
- Farmers Olympics
- Pie auction
- Battle of the bands
- Soccer
- Car contest
- Toilet Bowl races
- Lawn mower races
- ATV pull
- Remote control cars
- High school music incorporate into fair
- Video dances for the youth
- Demo tent i.e. blacksmith, quilting etc
- Antique display
- Fireworks
- Dog show
- "Back seat driver" blindfolded driver with a back seat driver
– lawn tractor, wheelbarrow, tricycle etc
- Look for new ideas and don't be afraid of trying new things
- High school drama productions
- Community productions
- Novelty races (outhouses, lawn mower etc)
- Contact local classes to do demos, step or square dances, karate)
- Story telling festival
- Talk to you chamber
- Shoe/boot kicking contest
- Rope making
- Sport clubs
- Don't forget the old faithful's egg tosses, sack races etc.



Your Fair's Responsibilities to your Ambassador: cont'd

- Involve them in local activities
- Do not leave responsibilities to organize an event up to the ambassador
- Have fairboard be approachable so ambassador can express questions, concerns listen to their ideas.
- Make the most out of the year
- Be open to them

Selection and Approval of Appropriate Ambassador Chaperones:

- Need to have a good screening process in place
- Rules for chaperone (need to be clear on what is to be followed)
- Male chaperone if you have a male ambassador
- Main goal of chaperone help with life skills, personal development, encourage individuality, guidance when needed.
- Agricultural Societies must select a proper Chaperone to accompany their ambassador during their year as ambassador.
- Chaperone required to supply the Agricultural Society with a Volunteer/Applicant Screening Process.
- Consent to disclosure of Personal Information. (available at local police)
- Form to be done every two years
- Female chaperone for female ambassador
- Chaperone to be honest, reliable and dedicated to the Ambassador
- Responsible for transportation and seeing that rooms are booked and paid for at Convention.
- Make arrangements for C.N.E.
- Help ambassador with presentation for speaking functions
- Me a motivator to the ambassador
- Give ambassador a schedule of events that they are to attend
- When ambassador gets a invitation to attend another fair let the Fair secretary know if they will be able to attend
- Have invitations for ambassador sent to fair office or secretary of their fair
- Have chaperone go around fair with ambassador for photo ops for the scrapbook
- If a member of the ambassador committee is unable to do the job then it should be a member of the executive or the homecraft director.

Making sure to Involve Youth at your fair:

- Ask the local schools to have a volunteer fair day.
- Bring in a few new things that will encourage youth to get involved
- Junior directors use them
- Give them jobs of interest not all the jobs you do not want to do
- Be open and get someone who is young to assist with the promoting
- Use credits at schools
- Have youth categories in your various areas of competition
- Talent show for youth
- Battle of the bands
- Have meetings with the youth on a regular basis
- Have a youth committee with the chair being a youth
- Survey student councils on how we can change so they will get involved

Your Fair's Responsibilities to Your Ambassador:

- Have clear guideline in place as to what you are to be looking after for the ambassador
- Money to the ambassador to cover costs related to fair business that they are doing on your behalf
- List of duties needs to be clear
- Provide transportation to various events
- One person to be the liaison with the ambassador
- Assist with organizing a link between the convention and CNE with the ambassador
- Assist financially
- Work on a schedule with the ambassador
- Chaperones for all events
- Make it a fun experience

MORE ROUND TABLE SUMMARIES FROM 2007 OAAS CONVENTION

Making sure to Involve Youth at your fair: cont'd

- 40 hours for schools
- Introduce sports events
- Introduce young ideas to the program
- Set a side one night for a youth event at the fair
- Change some activities to a more of a youth directed concept
- Recognize them.
- Youth booth at fair for ideas
- Look at limits for number of years on the board
- Advertise for youth
- They are the future.

Hosting a judging School:

- Everyone should host a school every 2 years
- \$10 a day with refreshments
- Saturday as during the week young people are working
- Advertise (local newspaper) get outside the usual places
- Ask people to bring things for the day to be judged
- Directors need to be responsible for this to be happening.
- Manuals need to be available
- Judging lists complete and accurate
- Keep it fun and educational
- Feed them
- Set up by district directors
- Attend school then apprentice
- Share lists among districts
- Fees need to be flexible
- Know your target audience
- Communication is needed between all involved
