2009 OAAS CONVENTION KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Friday February 20, 2008: PHIL HURST

Making the Unusual the Usual – "Making the Unusual the Usual" is not just a slogan for Phil Hurst; it's a philosophy that helps to draw over 300,000 attendees each year to the Clay County Fair located in Spencer, Iowa. Located in Northwest Iowa, and with a population of 11,317, Spencer is the largest city within a 90 mile radius.

You will find yourself laughing with pure enjoyment as Hurst regales you with amusing stories of how he fell in love with fairs as a youth by discovering unusual things that only could be found at the fair. He truly found that he loved fairs because the made the Unusual the Usual. He then takes that initial love of the fair and lays out a plan of action to ensure that we not only build that zest for fairs in our current fairgoers, but that we can grow by creating new fairgoers with the same love of fairs.

"Making the Unusual the Usual" will not only keep you laughing, but will have an impact on how you plan your event in the future!

<u>Phil Hurst</u> – Phil Hurst brings a diverse background to his position as Secretary/Manager of the Clay County Fair. Hurst, a decorated Vietnam War veteran, served 19 years as the Clay County Auditor and the Commissioner of Elections and 4 years as a Judicial Magistrate for the State of Iowa prior to becoming Secretary/Manager of the Clay County Fair in Spencer, Iowa in 1999.

Saturday February 21, 2008: STUART McINTOSH

In 1994, Stu McIntosh, the founder of Insight Enterprises, was a leading sales manager for a Fortune 500 company when he instantly lost his sight in what was considered routine eye surgery.

Suddenly finding himself unsighted and unemployed, Stu experienced the greatest struggle of his life. After recovering from the trauma, he realized just how difficult it is for a person with a disability to secure employment.

His own struggles and successes inspired him to found Insight Enterprises and devote his life to assisting other people with disabilities to reach their employment goals. In 2000, he became a service provider for the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and is considered a leading service provider in the province. Over the years, Stu and his staff have helped hundreds of people with disabilities to live full and productive lives.

In 2005, Insight Enterprises expanded its services to include injured workers. As a secondary service provider for Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB), Insight Enterprises assists injured workers with skills training and work placement experience to prepare them to re-enter the workforce.

INTERESTING FACTS:

- To maintain corporate status all agricultural societies in Ontario must file an annual return with OMAFRA.
- An annual return includes statement of officers and directors for the incoming year & an audited financial statement.
- To receive a grant your agricultural society must complete all required forms. All grants are paid based on society eligibility and funds appropriated by the Ontario Legislature.
- All societies must submit forms by **February 1**st, 2009. Forms must be sent to the designated OMAFRA offices.

OAAS Adventures in Saskatoon, at CAFÉ -

Saskatoon was the site of the 2008 CAFE Convention held Nov. 5-8. 207 delegates were treated to western hospitality at its finest. Ontario's presence was known since representatives from OAAS (Harry, Janette and Kathryn), Helen Scutt from OMAFRA, and fair delegates from Western Fair, Carp, Markham, CNE, Paris, Thunder Bay. Ottawa, Barrie, Norfolk and Forest attended. Keynote speaker Dr. Joseph Goldblatt addressed the "Top Ten Trends in Canadian Fairs and Exhibitions" in order to advance our organizations into the future. An aging population, the number of events being held vielding less revenue for organizers, the scarcity of volunteers, rising insurance costs, unstable public funding for events and sustainability of individual organizations were some of the concerns he explained. Several seminars and panel discussions dealing with family fun, going green, counterfeit money, heightening board energy and synergy, managing facilities and grounds, to surviving through humour were attended. Throughout the Convention, showcase acts performed and delegates were asked to vote for their favourite. Congratulations to "The Essentials", an acapella group from Toronto, who were named the "Best Showcase Act at 2008 CAFE". The culmination of the Canadian Youth Talent Competition also took place. 14 young people from 11 zones across Canada competed. Congratulations to Jade Lester who represented Southern Ontario and Western Fair on her winning performance. Adele Moore was named the 2009 CAFE President and congratulations to Harry Emmott on his election to the CAFE Board as second vice-president. The networking between Fair Associations from across Canada was invaluable. Many ideas and information were exchanged and new contacts made. Congratulations to the CAFE staff - Hannah, Kim, and Mavis - for an excellent conference. A special thank vou to Prairieland Park for showing us that Saskatoon rocks!!!!

CELEBRATE ONTARIO 2009 - *Celebrate Ontario 2009* is a \$9 million program to increase the economic potential of new and existing tourism festivals and events. The program is open to festivals and events taking place in Ontario between April 1, 2009 and March 31, 2010.

NEW!! This year, the program offers three levels of financial support:

- 1) Up to \$50,000 for festivals and events with operating budgets of less than \$250,000
- 2) Up to \$100,000 for festivals or events with operating budgets between \$250,000 and \$1 million annually
- 3) Up to \$400,000 for festivals or events with operating budgets in excess of \$1 million annually.

To apply for funding, applicants are asked to fill out the *Celebrate Ontario 2009* application form and review the application guide carefully before submitting.

The deadline for applications is January 16, 2009.

FCC Expression Fund Supporting Canada's official languages

The following brief article will hopefully provide you with one very good reason: education! As our province becomes more urbanized and as our population moves further away from the farm, our fairs continue to be an extremely valuable source of agricultural education and awareness.

For example, think of the person who, for the first time:

- sees a cow
- watches a milking demonstration
- observes piglets nursing from the sow
- takes in the vegetable display and competition
- intently watches a 4-H competition.
- sees a sheep being shorn
- takes in a horse demonstration or competition
- hears the crow of a rooster, quack of a duck etc.
- wanders through the barns and buildings
- reads the price tags on the displayed farm

Your assistance at your local fair has helped these folks increase their knowledge of agriculture and agri-food. Never take your volunteer work lightly - you have a tremendous impact on the non farm public with each task you perform at your fair, no matter how large or small.

Western Fair's Youth Talent finalist takes first place at National Youth Talent Competition in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

It won't be long before the name, Jade Lester, rolls off the tongue of every Country/Pop music aficionado from Nashville to New Zealand. Jade Lester, a 17-year-old, from the small town of Chatham, Ontario won first place at the 2008 Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions National Youth Talent Finals held on Friday, November 7 at the Prairieland Trade Centre, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, during the Association's annual convention. Jade was the 2008 Western Fair Youth Talent Finalist this past September, making her eligible to compete in the Youth Talent National Competition.

Judging for the youth talent competition is based on Natural Ability, Quality of Performance, Showmanship & Audience Rapport. Jade sparkled in her recent Saskatoon performance, as she has in so many shows across Ontario. Gifted with an angelic voice and commanding stage presence, she is an accomplished vocalist and musician who has won countless awards, prizes, scholarships and trophies.

Also of note, the second place winner in the national competition was Gabriella Caruso, Vocal Solo representing the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto Zone and Connor Steele-Falconer, Vocal Solo, representing the Pacific National Exhibition, British Columbia Zone, who took home third.

The National Youth Talent Awards is an annual event presented by the Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions since 1991, the Awards celebrate the performing arts talents of Canada's youth. Young Canadians between 13 and 21, representing fourteen zones from across Canada, perform their way from the local fair to the provincial zone level and then on to the National Finals. Since its inception, the National Youth Talent Awards have been supported by Conklin Shows, through the Patty Conklin Memorial Fund.

Youth Talent preliminary competitions take place across Ontario, prior to the Western Fair finals in September. Watch for 2009 competitions in Clinton, Burgessville, Barrie, Hamilton, Del-Ko-Brydge (Delaware, Komoka, Mount Brydges), Essex, Sarnia, Listowel, London, Kitchener, Stratford, Tillsonburg, Bayfield, Ridgetown, Woodstock, Teeswater, Paris, Glencoe and Thorndale.)

Some notable performers who have participated at some level in this competition over the years are; Jamie Warren, Beverley Mahood, Tiffany Deriveau, Andrea Henry of "Sugar Jones", Michael Bublé, Paul Brandt, and Alannis Morrissette.
