Engaging a High School Audience At Local Fairs



At the April 5th meeting of the OAAS executive, Ontario Agri-Food Education Inc. (OAFE) Executive Director, Colleen Smith, made a presentation that outlined a collaborative funding proposal to work with agricultural societies that looks beyond the traditional market of elementary students and provides opportunities to engage high school students with their events and the community. Working more closely with high school students will help ag societies meet current challenges of economic viability, relevance to student learning, and volunteer recruitment and retention.

OAFE has successfully partnered with OAAS members for many years, providing educational resources and materials to support the student learning taking place at fairs as well as curriculum linking the education programs to make them relevant to elementary teachers and students.

OAFE is both pleased and excited at the prospect of partnering with OAAS in a funding application that will encourage long-term viability of agricultural fairs and events, greater understanding of the agri-food sector and career opportunities for high school students, while at the same time build long-term community and volunteer involvement.

Workplace Safety Insurance Board Legislation

As of January 1st, 2013, the Ontario Government made it mandatory for most workers in the construction industry to have coverage with the WSIB.

What do Fairs who hire Construction Contractors have to do?

Before any construction work starts, get a <u>clearance number</u> from your contractor(s).

What is a clearance number?

1.

- A business/contractor will provide a certificate with a clearance number to the hiring company (the fair) to prove they are registered with theWSIB and that their account is in good standing. Certificates with clearance numbers are provided free by WSIB to contractors in good standing. The certificate is valid for up to 90 days from the date of issue.
- 2. The hiring company (the fair) must ensure that each separate contractor provides a clearance number that is valid for the full length of the job. If the job lasts longer than the certificate expiry date, then a new certificate should be requested.
- 3. Go online at <u>www.wsib.on.ca</u> to verify the clearance number.
- 4. If the clearance number is not valid, do not allow the contractor to start work.

What are the consequences of non-compliance to this new legislation?

If construction work goes ahead without a valid clearance number, both the hiring company and the contractor are committing an offence and will face fines and serious penalties. The maximum fine for a conviction of an offence is \$100,000.

Strategic Planning Pilot Project for Agricultural Societies

The OAAS is partnering with the Ministry of Agriculture & Food and the Ministry of Rural Affairs on a "Strategic Planning Pilot Project" to build organizational capacity of individual agricultural societies and the OAAS.

Why are we doing this project? Many agricultural societies are doing a great job at putting on their annual fair event, but are not thinking beyond this annual activity. Some societies have completed a strategic plan, but are not actively using the plan to move their organizations forward. Many societies have considered this process, but don't have the financial resources to hire a professional consultant.

A strategic plan process helps organizations:

- To clarify vision and mission
- To identify issues and potential concerns
- To focus on goals that will make a difference to their organization
- To develop realistic action plans
- To build skills and leadership of volunteers to maintain the process

There was a great response to participate in the pilot project, and three groups have been organized:

Group 1 (Paris, Rockton, Ancaster & Dunnville), started on March 22

Group 2 (Collingwood, Erin, and Caledon), will start on April 26

Group 3 by webex (Moore, Dryden, Hymers, and Oliver), at planning stage with start date still to be determined.

Each society has committed to having five volunteers participate in the training sessions. The volunteers will attend the training sessions (Groups 1 and 2 will have three in-person training sessions) and then work through the strategic planning process with their own society's larger strategic planning group. We will be evaluating the process and the resources at each step of the pilot.

Content for the three sessions is based on the Strategic Planning Framework:

- Preparation for Strategic Planning
- Mission and Vision
- Analysis of data including Environmental Scan
- Setting Goals
- Action planning and Performance measures
- Implementation
- Track and Review

Anticipated Results of the Pilot Project:

Each participating agricultural society will have:

- experienced a strategic planning process
- a completed strategic plan
- volunteers trained to maintain the strategic plan process

Anticipated Outcomes of the Pilot Project:

Agricultural societies will build their organization's capacity by:

- Increasing the number of volunteers trained to do strategic planning
- Increasing the leadership skills of their volunteers
- Increasing collaboration between agricultural societies
- Developing a network for support for continued organizational development
