OAAS Partners With OMAFRA Obtaining Premises ID Information

Working together, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) and the Ontario Association of Agriculture Societies (OAAS), will be contacting your fair as the OAAS has made an initiative to get all of its members registered under the Ontario Provincial Premises Registry and to obtain Premises Identification Number (PID) for all of their venues. The Provincial Premises Registry is the destination for registering parcels of land in Ontario associated with agri-food activities. The PPR is an OMAFRA initiative and the only official provincial registry for obtaining a PID for Ontario agri-food businesses.

What is a Premises ID used for?

A Premises ID is the first step to an effective traceability system and can lead to business advantages such as operational efficiencies and increasing market access. Accurate premises verification and identification is critical to the strength of our agriculture and food industries. Highest quality location information will assist emergency response efforts by improving emergency preparedness, responsiveness and risk management due to natural disasters, plant and / or animal disease.

There are a few ways to register your premises:

Convention Survey Comments

- Offer coffee throughout the convention: The OAAS contacted the Food Services at the hotel, coffee for 700 people would be approximately \$3500 + tax & gratuities. To add muffins add another \$3300 + tax & gratuities. For one coffee break, convention registration rate would increase by \$10 per person, for one coffee break. (or you can walk 5 minutes and spend \$3.00)
- The seating offered on Thursday & Friday Evening was awful: Thank you for the feedback, we completely understand. The venue location for Thursday and Friday evening were moved to Concert Hall to accommodate the overwhelming successful growing tradeshow. Looking forward to 2016, OAAS has already met with production crew to improve sound quality and room layout will be updated to accommodate more delegates comfortably.
- The convention needs to move: The OAAS hears this comments every year. "It's easier said than done." The OAAS convention occupies 450 rooms per night (under one roof). Also required ALL AT THE SAME TIME: 8 seminar rooms at one time (occupy approx 80 ppl/room), tradeshow (80 booths), large craft room, have evening program room setup, Silent Auction room. The Fairmont Royal York offers an extremely feasible rate for the seminar rooms, but only if the guest room block is filled. The numerous nearby food vendors is very key, as many are within a few blocks of the hotel and overall can accommodate the 700+ convention delegates.
- Annual General Meeting should be on Friday/AGM speakers got short-changed: The comments regarding the new convention schedule
 with the AGM on the Saturday received mixed comments. However the OAAS feels for the one-day delegates to receive the most "bang
 for their buck", we would offer two more seminars and additional time to view the tradeshow, craftroom and Family Entertainment
 Showcase. For fair members who have work conflicts, a Saturday AGM provided another opportunity to attend the AGM.

In regards to the keynote speaker at the AGM, the OAAS is thrilled to confirm that *Dan Needles* has agreed to be the kick off speaker for the 2016 Convention, Friday morning and therefore the AGM will be strictly business in 2016.

Avian Influenza Advisory for Small Flock Owners and Bird Fanciers

On April 8, 2015, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) confirmed the presence of a highly pathogenic H5N2 avian influenza virus at a turkey farm near Woodstock, Ontario. Avian influenza (AI) can infect domesticated and wild birds, including chickens, turkeys, pheasants, quails, ducks, geese, pigeons, psittacines and guinea fowl. A highly pathogenic virus, as opposed to a low pathogenic virus, can causes severe illness and death in domestic birds. Some of the bird species may not be affected to this extent but will be able to infect other species. Birds become infected when they have direct contact with the secretions or feces of infected birds, or with contaminated surfaces or infected food and water supplies.

People who raise small flocks or game birds for personal or limited commercial purposes should be aware of the risk to their birds from diseases such as avian influenza. During an avian influenza outbreak, attending poultry events can increase the risk of spreading diseases. Diseases are most often transmitted from one infected flock to another flock by infected birds, and contaminated people or equipment. Moving infected birds can result in transferring AI virus to a new location. If infected birds are moved through an auction, or "swap meet", then the AI virus can be transferred to multiple new locations. Birds that appear to be healthy can be infected and can transmit AI to other birds before exhibiting any signs of disease themselves.

Birds with outdoor access should not share areas with wild ducks, geese, or shorebirds. Make sure free-range areas do not have attractions for wild waterfowl, such as a pond or open feeders, which may become contaminated with wild waterfowl droppings.

Be very diligent in observing your birds. Monitor mortalities and track feed and water consumption. Watch for any signs of disease, such as depression, decreased feed consumption, drop in egg production, swollen wattles, sneezing, gasping, a discharge from the nose or eyes, diarrhea or sudden death.

Early detection is critical. Should you suspect any signs of health concerns in your flock, contact your veterinarian immediately.

Prevention is the key. Take the following steps:

- · Avoid attending shows, sales, and swap meets during a disease outbreak.
- Do not allow people who have recently been in contact with other birds (e.g., their own or attending a bird sale or show) near your birds.
- Do not share equipment with other bird owners.
- If you add new birds to your flock, at any time, make sure that you get their complete background
 information, including a history of any diseases and vaccinations, and keep the vendor's contact
 information in the event that your birds become sick, so that they can be traced to their flock of origin.
- Keep new birds or those returning from shows separate and preferably in a different airspace (quarantined) for at least 2-4 weeks after returning home, and monitor them for signs of illness. Clean and disinfect the cages and equipment used for these birds. Use separate clothing, footwear and equipment for quarantined birds, and handle them last. If the same equipment and clothing must be used, clean and disinfect them before and after handling the birds. Wash your hands between the two groups.
