Birdhouse fundraising project

Fundraising in the middle of a world-wide pandemic is not a comfortable situation. The usual techniques for fundraising have to be discarded and new methods sought for each community. At times fundraising opportunities just fall into your lap because of the conditions people are in.

In the Bayfield community, a birdhouse fundraising project was brought forward by one of the Directors of the **Bayfield Agricultural Society** who became the intermediary between two of our seasoned members. Both of these members have had major changes in their lives and birdhouse making and painting became their way to deal with it.

One of these folks had taken up residence in a local retirement home so her medical needs could be better managed. She was always very active and found residential life was not as stimulating as she would like. Her cousin, who visits her regularly, thought resuming painting might be an excellent creative pastime and provide a rewarding experience; however, finding things to paint became a challenge.



The other member had just moved into a 55+ community townhouse complex with his wife from a hobby farm not far away. He found not doing things as in the past frustrating and so he would go back to his workshop at his farm to tinker away his time. When told about the need for something that could be painted, he came up with the idea of painting birdhouses that he would make with scraps. And so, the project began! He would make birdhouses; they would be taken to the lady for painting and then he would seal them for outdoor use. The challenge then was what to do with this growing number of birdhouses that were covered with painted birds, other wildlife, outdoor scenes, and landscapes. The two decided to donate them to their church and their Agricultural Society.

Currently over \$1000 has been raised by the Bayfield Ag Society so far from the generosity of two people who needed something fulfilling and worthwhile to spend time on. As the weather is getting colder the two have gotten together to plan what they might diversify into for the winter months. Talk is that bird feeders are possibly the next project.

One of our Directors is going through cancer treatments, and he decided to join the project and began building a different style of birdhouse to keep busy as his treatments progress. Some others on the Board are picking up discarded wood from building sites, with permission, and delivering to the two men for their wood stock. The availability of the birdhouses has been advertised online throughout the village. One person wanted all the birdhouses with one particular bird painted on them since it was his favourite. Another brought her grandchildren to choose a birdhouse because she wanted them to have a reminder of the fair which she has enjoyed since her youth. Another wanted one for decoration as a reminder of both the builder and painter and insisted that both sign the house. The houses became a link between the people and the fair or Society. Three people who are all going through major changes in their lives have connected with the common bond of helping organizations in their community. Covid or not, they are not letting a little pandemic put a roadblock into supporting fundraising for their favourite causes or curtail what each of them needs to do to fill their time with valuable activity. The Ag Society absolutely feels blessed that it has such generous, talented, and thoughtful members who are helping it get through these very unusual times. (Fall 2020)

The Feversham Agricultural Society held its first Fall Fair in 1867 (the same year that Canada became a country). In 2017, the Fair (and this great nation) shared the honour of celebrating 150 years! It is always held in September (two weekends after Labour Day), and its goal is to encourage an awareness of agriculture and improve the guality of life for people living in the area.

The jam-packed event starts with a Friday evening concert featuring local talent, as well as a Junior and Senior Ambassador contest. Saturday begins with a parade featuring many local floats, bands, classic cars, horses, and lots of families. The day continues with live music, local vendors, livestock shows, antiques displays, programs for children, and an antique tractor pull. The Farmer Olympics,

which are also held during the Fair, are always a highlight (and we have it on good authority that this event has been excluded from the traditional Olympics because it would be unfair to dominate the competition)! Sunday starts with a truck pull followed by the field tractor pull. Food booths offer many tasty options and are on site throughout the weekend. It's a very busy and exciting time for the entire community!

TRILLIUM GRANT WILL ALLOW FOR INSTALL OF ACCESSIBLE BLEACHERS

Earlier this year, the **Bayfield Agricultural Society (BAS) received a \$31,400** Resilient Communities Fund grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) to install three accessible bleachers in Agricultural Park in the village. On Friday, Aug. 21, MPP Lisa Thompson and OTF volunteer Emma Bartz, were there for the opening night of the Society's annual fair.

"Over the years Ontario Trillium Foundation grants, and the newly created Resilient Communities Fund, have helped a lot of organizations accomplish a great deal of their goals and objectives. However, this grant to the

Bayfield Agricultural Society is especially pleasing, important, and indeed, timely," said Huron-Bruce MPP Lisa Thompson. "It is yet another step towards getting us all back together safely."

Safety equipment was also provided for volunteers and visitors to the annual agricultural fair organized by the BAS. Consisting of masks, shields and sanitizing stations, this equipment will be used for this year's fair, which ran from Aug. 20-22. The new bleachers, which will be arriving soon, will provide improved accessibility for everyone for the events that take place in the park for years to come. The Resilient Communities Fund was created to help non-profit organizations



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rebound and recover from the impacts of COVID-19.

"The effect of this Ontario Trillium Foundation grant is huge," said President of the BAS, Pamela Stanley. "This grant has given our Society the opportunity to have a safe fair experience but a long-term benefit of greater accessibility for visitors at events in our park. Our park has always been a community park and now becomes more welcoming to all."

The BAS is aiming to make this multi-purpose park more accessible for activities, whether sports activities or the fair. Anyone who may want to inquire about using the park for an event is asked to please visit the BAS website at: www.bayfieldfair.ca

Provincial Highlights & Information

• **Provincial Competitions**

Since not all fairs will be able to compete in the District and Provincial Competitions again this year, the OAAS Board made the decision in April to cancel the OAAS Competitions at the 2022 Convention.

Watch for some **new** information coming shortly regarding a couple new competitions

• Delay Judges' Requirements deadline until January 1, 2023

With the continued public health stipulations due to the pandemic, we don't expect that any judging schools will be held before the fall. Because of this, the OAAS will again modify the "*Requirements for OAAS Certified & Apprentice Judges Policy*" and update the December 31, 2021 deadline to January 1, 2023, so Judges don't need to worry about recertifying during the pandemic

- <u>The OAAS Board approved that the 2021 Agricultural Society membership</u> fee be the same as was paid in 2019 if paid by December 1st, 2021. If the fee is not paid, a 20% interest charge will apply. OAAS will be sending each Agricultural Society an invoice with the account due.
- **NEW**: Watch for announcement of a new OAAS Youth Scholarship Program
- <u>NEW:</u> DUUO and The Co-operators "*New Vendor Online Insurance Program*" more information about this program is coming soon. Vendor insurance is an extremely important element of risk management and the OAAS is working with DUUO and The Co-operators to make this affordable simple-to-use insurance available for our agricultural societies and their fairs and events.

- 21% held/are holding traditional or modified traditional fairs
- 15 % held/are holding a hybrid fair— a combination of in-person and virtual events
- 18% held/are holding virtual fairs i.e., homecraft and agricultural (including livestock) exhibits/competitions
- 10% held/are holding other events instead of their traditional fair i.e., Farmers' Markets, laneway, home, or business decorating displays/ competitions, drive thru dinners, fun days, horse shows, drive thru fairs, parades, photo contests
- 29% cancelled their fair and didn't hold any events
- 7% unknown status they didn't submit information and/or their website/social media wasn't updated to allow us to determine if they were holding a fair
